President's Message



2001 was a tumultuous year for all Americans! Our country was shaken to its foundation by terrorists. Out of the tragedies we are emerging as a more tolerant and united country. That is the silver lining.

The past twelve months have also been eventful for CAPA Ed Fund; several of our Board Members participated in the East Bay Asian Voter Education Consortium (EBAVEC) and struggled with the redistricting efforts mandated by the 2000 Census. Despite forming a coalition with the Hispanic Americans and lobbying against the new realignments, the politics of redistricting minimized the influences of Asians and in several new districts, particularly in Alameda County.

On September 29, 2001 we participated in the Northern California Chinese American 911 Relief Fund Rally. In May several Board Members participated in the very successful Save Angel Island League (SAIL) project. CAPA Ed Fund is very proud to have played a role in these important events.

We have also sponsored a very successful "Leadership Forum" in November. About 200 Asian American Leaders in the Bay Area (and elsewhere) were invited to our Fall Forum featuring Henry Tang of the Committee of 100 and J. D. Hokoyama of the Leadership Education for Asian Pacifics (LEAP). Out of this event, all participants agreed to establish a forum to coordinate our activities and to exchange information. This forum, now named Northern California Asian American

Forum (NCAAF), is operational and interested parties are invited to join.

We continue to work with Citizen for a Better Community and Vision New America (our counterparts in Fremont and the Silicon Valley) to form a cooperative Internship Program. The three organizations have agreed to work together to jointly select the most qualified interns for out of the area placements.

Several of our Advisors and Board Members participated and gave important inputs to the Articles of Incorporation of the 80-20 initiative. We also applaud our members for their independent efforts in raising funds for a number of public officials. Although political fund raising is not a chartered activity of our organization, we congratulate these individuals for taking an active role.

Finally, after careful deliberations, CAPA is taking the next step. During our 18+ years of history, we have always depended on our hard working and dedicated Board to spearhead and carry out our mission and its associated events. While this strategy has been very successful and cost effective, we have grown to a point that we need the help of a staff member.

Therefore, it is with great pleasure and pride to announce that Emily Chang has agreed to be our first Executive Director. Emily has grown up in the CAPA family – she started out as an Intern and has been an upstanding Board Member for several years. She is eminently qualified with good working experience and is a graduate from both Stanford and Berkeley.

Please join me in welcoming Emily! We look for great things from her.





Mike Honda was recently named "High Tech Legislator of the Year" by the American Electronics Association for his effective leadership in support the New Economy. But his life story began far from political power and the high-tech world of Silicon Valley that he now represents.

Mike Honda was born in California, but spent his early childhood with his family in an internment camp in Colorado during World War II. His family returned to California in 1953, becoming strawberry sharecroppers in Blossom Valley in South San Jose.

In 1965, Mike interrupted his college studies to answer President Kennedy's call for volunteer service. He served two years in the Peace Corps building schools and health clinics in El Salvador. Mike returned from the Peace Corps fluent in Spanish with a passion for teaching.

Mike went on to earn a degree in Biological Sciences, a BA in Spanish and a Masters in Education. He became a science teacher in Sunnyvale and conducted educational research at Stanford. Mike became a principal of two public schools while, marrying and raising his family in what is now called Silicon Valley.

In 1971, Mike was appointed by then-Mayor Norm Mineta to the San Jose City Planning Commission. In 1981, Mike was elected to the San Jose Unified School Board. In 1990, Mike became the first and only Asian Pacific American to serve on the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors. Mike was elected to the California Assembly in 1996 and was reelected in 1998 with over 75% of the vote. In over 20 years of public service, Mike Honda has never lost an election.

On the Education Committee in the California State Assembly, Mike worked with Governor Davis to draft landmark education reforms - including smaller class size and increases in teachers' benefits. California's teachers have always supported Mike for his proven dedication to fighting for California's public schools. As Chair of the Assembly Public Safety Committee Mike worked to pass sensible gun safety legislation to keep guns out of the hands of juveniles and voted to ban assault weapons.

As a newly elected Member of Congress from Silicon Valley, Mr. Honda is taking a leading role in bringing Democrats and Republicans together to better understand technology issues. In this vein, Honda is forming a bipartisan Task Force on Mobile Commerce to enable Congress to better understand and support innovative companies that are bringing us the next generation of technology in the wireless industry.

Mike serves on the House Budget Committee; on the Transportation Committee, including its subcommittees on Aviation, Highway & Transit, and Water Resources & Environment; and on the Science Committee, including its subcommittee on Research. Mike's wife, Jeanne, is a teacher at Baldwin Elementary School in San Jose. They have two grown children, Mark, an aerospace engineer, and Michelle who recently earned her Masters in public health.

Kristen Sze is the weekday co-anchor for the ABC7 Midday News and a general assignment reporter for the ABC7 News at 5 and 6. She previously anchored the station's weekday morning show, weekend 6 and 11 p.m. newscasts, and the ABC7 Sunday morning news.

Fluent in Mandarin Chinese, Ms. Sze was assigned to cover the devastating 1999 earthquake in Taiwan, her birthplace. She provided on-site reports of the tragedy and was the only reporter representing Bay Area television stations. Since joining ABC7, Ms. Sze won a 1999 Emmy Award for best children and youth segment for "Spin-Out School," a story about a unique driving school targeting teenagers.

A Bay Area resident since the age of eight, Ms. Sze received her Bachelor of Arts in Political Science at the University of California at Berkeley. She is member of the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society. A scholarship from the Asian American Journalists Association enabled Ms. Sze to study at Oxford University in England. She later became the scholarship coordinator for that organization.

Ms. Sze has volunteered her time to a number of community organizations, among them Self Help for the Elderly and the Chinese Historical Society in San Francisco. She has also worked with the

Oakland Chamber of Commerce and with both the San Mateo County Women's Hall of Fame and the Crisis Center where she has been a crisis counselor.







Great food is a family affair

■ Look to Three Brothers From China for dishes piled high with delicious entrees

I knew Three Brothers From China was going to be good the moment we walked in the door. It was early on a Sunday night and both of the medium-sized dining rooms were already full.

As we were led to our table, we passed large and small family groups happily chatting and eating from plates piled high with seafood. The servers moved with a purpose, giving the dining room a sense of ordered chaos -- like the energy of a busy street corner.

The three brothers from China ---Steve, Allan and Ivan Li-have been in the United States for some 10 years. Their Pleasant Hill restaurant has been open since 1992; they opened another in San Ramon in 1994, and, by the look of the crowds, the Valley could easily support another


The decor in the Pleasant Hill restaurant is uncluttered and wellworn. There are bright pink napkins, some large and small paintings and a quiet bar area, but the real focus is on the food -- evidenced by the

tank of live crabs and lobsters built into a back wall.

There are two menus: a large plastic-coated one with more than 100 traditional-style dishes, and a smaller (only 60 choices) one that emphasizes seafood, steamed dishes and simple combinations. Both menus offer complete dinners, but the smaller one has three truly unusual dinners composed of eight or nine courses for one set price (\$48, \$68, \$98): We ordered the seafoodladen \$68 menu and, while it took



some time to get started, dinner soon moved into high gear.

The first course brought a gigantic terrine of soup loaded with imitation crab, silken tofu, green onions and beef tripe. Even after the five of us had second cups, there was still nearly a quart of the sesame-infused soup to take home.

The next course of braised scallops and baby bok choy was, with its lightly sweetened, cornstarch-thickened sauce, the closest dish to typical American-Chinese food we had.

But the generous portion of plump scallops, fork-tender bok choy and exotic mushrooms made it both unique and outstanding.

The table becomes crowded quickly, so be sure to save a space near you for the dry sautéed prawns -- they are truly remarkable. Completely greaseless, encased in what seems like an impossibly thin tempura batter, the medium-sized shrimp arrive in their shell with the head on. The shrimp are so fresh and delicate that the entire thing is edible.

As the courses continued to arrive, we began to feel like royalty at a wedding banquet.

There was a quick and furious stir-fry of peppers, onions and meaty beef strips. A liberal dose of black pepper made this dish particularly well-suited to steamed rice.

A whole cracked crab was next, cooked live and coated in a light sauce infused with ginger and scallions. Much of the fun of this meal came from so many dishes that are cooked whole and allow you to eat with your hands. Licking your fingers and searching for hidden jewels creates a feeling of relaxed celebration.

Peking-style pork comes on the bone in the form of tender braised thin chops. They eat like Chinese

spareribs, with a sauce that is sweet but not cloying.

A large half-chicken is also served on the bone: It's crisply deep-fried and cut into manageable-sized pieces. The deep-frying keeps the flesh steamy-moist, and a side dish of sea salt and pepper lets you season it on the spot, bringing out the poultry's true flavor.

The brothers travel to San Francisco's Chinatown (so you don't have to) almost every day, where they purchase all their produce, meat and seafood. That explains how they can offer both high quality and quantity at such reasonable prices.

The final savory course was also

fish. There was more bone than meat, but the flesh was sweet, moist and flavorful from a light sauce perfumed with cilantro and ginger.

The restaurants' success is partly due to the brothers' willingness to listen. Steve and Allan work the front of the house, talk to the customers and use the feedback to refine their recipes.

If the myriad choices aren't adequate, they are happy to cook it your way - whatever way that may be. Ivan, who is the oldest, oversees the kitchen and demonstrates both talent and commitment.

It was hard for me to get excited about dessert - a warm, gray and intensely sweet tapioca soup - but by that point even a fortune cookie looked intimidating.

It may have taken me too long to find this restaurant, but I'm already the flashiest: a whole deep-fried cod-scheming to make up for lost time.
