President's Message



Good evening ladies and gentlemen, on behalf of CAPA Community Education Fund I would like to welcome you to our gala. This is a special year for us as we celebrate the 20th anniversary of our founding organization, the Chinese American Political Association. CAPA was founded in 1984 to give political voice to the Asian community living in the East Bay. Its singular focus in mission and the decision to serve a local community has proven to be the right recipe for maintaining a loyal constituency. As the organization steadily grew, and with a new appreciation of the difficult tasks ahead, it was soon realized that it was not enough to have a forum to attract other Asians with similar concerns. More had to be done to attract the Asian community as a whole to engage in broader civic participation and to develop young future leaders.

Thus, in 1998 the CAPA Community Education Fund was established to support and encourage broader civic participation in the Asian community through education and training. One of our most successful activities is the Student Summer Internship Program. We have graduated 170 interns since 1991. This year's applicant pool is the largest ever, competing for half the number of slots, making this program a truly competitive one. Another popular activity is the Voter Education Program. We started the Public Office Candidates Debates in 1992 and has since held a debate on every election year. Participants at some debates on contested seats ranged from federal congressional districts to the county supervisors. The attendance on some debates reached upwards of 350 people.

We are proud to say that our organization has been held as a model by numerous organizations with similar aspirations: Citizens for Better Community (CBC) serving the Fremont area, Asian Pacific Islander American Public Affairs Association (APAPA) serving the Sacramento area, and Vision New America (VNA) serving the San Jose area. We are also a founding member of the East Bay Asian Voter Education Consortium (EBAVEC). These organizations are here tonight to celebrate with us.

But what does CAPA Community Education Fund mean to each one of us on a personal level? For those who are first generation immigrants, we must remind ourselves that our children's future is here in America, and it is our duty to help them grow to become responsible, contributing citizens and future leaders of this nation. For the generations that are born here, you must remember the unique cultural values instilled in you so that you may add them to the tapestry of this country that Abraham Lincoln once called the Great Experiment. It is our aspiration and our duty that we all step up to be 21st Century American Leaders. This is the vision of CAPA Community Education Fund.

Thank you for your continued support; we wouldn't be here today without you. Enjoy the evening!



S. B. Woo

Former Lt. Governor of State of Delaware President, The 80-20 Initiative



Dr. S.B. (Shien-Biau) Woo is a retired physics professor and former Lt. Governor of Delaware. He was born in Shanghai, China, and came to the United States from Hong Kong at the age of 18.

He is currently the president of The 80-20 Initiative that works on organizing Asian Pacific Americans (APAs) into a swing bloc vote in presidential elections, thereby inducing both major political parties to take rightful interests of the APAs community into proper consideration.

S.B.'s past experiences include being the Founding President of the Faculty Bargaining Unit at the University of Delaware, its Chief Spokesman and Chief Negotiator; a Trustee of the University of Delaware; an Institute Fellow at the Institute of Politics, the Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University; and serving as the National President of the Organization of Chinese Americans (OCA).

He is listed in Who's Who in America. A life-sized picture of him is displayed in Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington D C. Another of his picture is in interactive display in the lobby of Asia Society in New York, NY. In 2000, aMagazine ranked him the 6th of the 25 Most Influential Asian Americans.

S.B. received his B.S., summa cum laude, in Mathematics and Physics from Georgetown College in Kentucky and his Ph.D. in Physics from Washington University in St. Louis in 1964.




EMILY CHANG

◆ The first issue of CAPA's Newsletter

CAPA was founded in 1984 by a group of Americans of Chinese ethnicity. The founders were motivated by an incident that involved their efforts to develop a retirement community in the Contra Costa County. The county approved their re-zoning application, but rejected their development plans. Strong racial overtones were heard during the numerous public hearings held on the project. This group of Chinese Americans sought the advice of many friends who were involved in the community, including some local public officials. They were advised to form a grass-roots organization that would prevent this type of mistreatment from happening again; thus was born the Chinese American Political Association. It was registered under the IRS tax code as a 527 Political Organization. It's mission is to provide a political voice for the Asian community. It is non-partisan, actively engages with local public officials, and help lobby for issues that promote fairness and diversity in our society. The organization has since grown and inspired the formation of many similar organizations within their local Asian communities.

•Another Successful Internship Program

We placed 12 interns in the offices of elected officials and governmental agencies in the summer of 2003. This has been our flagship program running for more than ten years. This 2003 interns put together an outstanding presentation at the Gala celebrating Asian American women.

•Increased Voter Registration Activities

Thanks to a generous grant from SBC Communications, Inc., CAPA Community Education Fund has teamed up with the East Bay Asian Voter Education Consortium to sponsor voter registration projects at high schools throughout Contra Costa and Alameda County.

Highlights: 2nd Annual Picnic



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

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Great food is a family affair

Look to Three Brothers From China for dishes piled high with delicious entrees

I knew Three Brothers From China was going to be good the moment we walked in the door. It was early on a Sunday night and both of the medium-sized dining rooms were already full.

As we were led to our table, we passed large and small family groups happily chatting and eating from plates piled high with seafood. The servers moved with a purpose, giving the dining room a sense of ordered chaos -- like the energy of a busy street corner.

The three brothers from China ---Steve, Allan and Ivan Li-- have been in the United States for some 10 years. Their Pleasant Hill restaurant has been open since 1992; they opened another in San Ramon in 1994, and, by the look of the crowds, the Valley could easily support another.


The decor in the Pleasant Hill restaurant is uncluttered and wellworn. There are bright pink napkins, some large and small paintings and a quiet bar area, but the real focus is on the food -- evidenced by the

tank of live crabs and lobsters built into a back wall.

There are two menus: a large plastic-coated one with more than 100 traditional-style dishes, and a smaller (only 60 choices) one that emphasizes seafood, steamed dishes and simple combinations. Both menus offer complete dinners, but the smaller one has three truly unusual dinners composed of eight or nine courses for one set price (\$48, \$68, \$98). We ordered the seafoodladen \$68 menu and, while it took



some time to get started, dinner soon moved into high gear.

The first course brought a gigantic terrine of soup loaded with imitation crab, silken tofu, green onions and beef tripe. Even after the five of us had second cups, there was still nearly a quart of the sesame-infused soup to take home.

The next course of braised scallops and baby bok choy was, with its lightly sweetened, cornstarch-thickened sauce, the closest dish to typical American-Chinese food we had.

But the generous portion of plump scallops, fork-tender bok choy and exotic mushrooms made it both unique and outstanding.

The table becomes crowded quickly, so be sure to save a space near you for the dry sautéed prawns - they are truly remarkable. Completely greaseless, encased in what seems like an impossibly thin tentpura batter, the medium-sized shrimp arrive in their shell with the head on. The shrimp are so fresh and delicate that the entire thing is edible.

As the courses continued to arrive, we began to feel like royalty at a wedding banquet.

There was a quick and furious stir-fry of peppers, onions and meaty beef strips. A liberal dose of black pepper made this dish particularly well-suited to steamed rice.

A whole cracked crab was next, cooked live and coated in a light sauce infused with ginger and scallions. Much of the fun of this meal came from so many dishes that are cooked whole and allow you to eat with your hands. Licking your fingers and searching for hidden jewels creates a feeling of relaxed celebration.

Peking-style pork comes on the bone in the form of tender braised thin chops. They eat like Chinese

spareribs, with a sauce that is sweet hut not cloying.

A large half-chicken is also served

on the hone: It's crisply deep-fried and cut into manageable-sized pieces. The deep-frying keeps the flesh steamy-moist, and a side dish of sea salt and pepper lets you season it on the spot, bringing out the poultry's true flavor.

The brothers travel to San Francisco's Chinatown (so you don't have to) almost every day, where they purchase all their produce, meat and seafood. That explains how they can offer both high quality and quantity at such reasonable prices.

The final savory course was also

fish. There was more bone than meat, but the flesh was sweet, moist and flavorful from a light sauce perfumed with cilantro and ginger.

The restaurants' success is partly due to the brothers' willingness to listen. Steve and Allan work the front of the house, talk to the customers and use the feedback to refine their

If the myriad choices aren't adequate, they are happy to cook it your way - whatever way that may be. Ivan, who is the oldest, oversees the kitchen and demonstrates both talent and commitment.

It was hard for me to get excited about dessert — a warm, gray and intensely sweet tapioca soup - but by that point even a fortune cookie looked intimidating.

It may have taken me too long to find this restaurant, but I'm already the flashiest: a whole deep-fried cod- scheming to make up for lost time.



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
